A topic that has drawn much interest and concern to members is the launch of the Continuous Professional Certification (CPC) program by the National Board of Certification and Recertification for Nurse Anesthetists (NBCRNA). The purpose of the NBCRNA is to determine certification and recertification standards and guidelines for CRNAs. The NBCRNA charted a possible future course for the recertification of CRNAs (the CPC) that was introduced at the Annual Meeting. The new requirements are causing concern among some members and the AANA Board of Directors has received numerous emails. However, the AANA and the NBCRNA function autonomously, so CRNAs should go to www.nbcrna.com for more information and to express their concerns.

3. Feedback can be given from **September 6, 2011** through **November 14, 2011**.

The NBCRNA is also conducting a Professional Practice Analysis (PPA) survey to help validate the content of the National Certification Examination (NCE) and to help define the framework for the exam in the future to ensure the exam's currency and relevance. Please take this survey before the deadline of September 12, 2011. A link is available on the NBCRNA homepage (www.nbcrna.com).

I will be attending a Board of Directors and Program Committee meeting in Chicago from September 7-11 to learn more about my role and the happenings of the AANA. Again, please let me know if I can serve you in any way.

Government Relations Committee Report

In my last report I detailed the introduction and status of LB 222. LB 222 would have simplified what is commonly called the 407 process. LB 407, passed in 1985, prescribed a process for recognizing and changing "scope of practice". Having participated in the process, NANA and others found it to be contentious and adversarial. LB 222 was referred for interim study and a meeting of the interested parties occurred on August 16th. Executive Director Ron Jensen represented NANA and reports that the meeting was very productive in that there was general agreement on what the revised credentialing review legislation should look like.

Health and Human Services Committee staff will work with the Nebraska Medical Association lobbyist to draft legislation and have it ready for a task force meeting in mid-October. As always, the devil will be in the details. Hopefully we will have the draft legislation available at the time of our NANA fall meeting in order to review it.

I recently attended the AANA Annual Meeting and I will share some interesting observations. AANA Past-President Paul Santoro compared the state of the health care industry to riding in a white water raft! He stated that whether or not the recently passed federal legislation goes into effect, changes will come that will be quick and tumultuous. That being said, NANA will need "oars in the water". A recent AANA survey of state organizations to assess contacts with the entities that can affect our future such as payors and regulators was sobering. The percentage of contacts was quite low. Establishing these contacts (getting oars in the water) will be critical going forward as reimbursement drops or shifts.

As a function of "government relations" you will see an increased effort to establish liaisons not only with legislators but others who can affect our future.

Future of Nursing: Campaign for Action Takes Shape in Nebraska

This past April NANA was asked to participate in a forum for the Nebraska Regional Action Coalition (NebRAC) as part of The Future of Nursing: *Campaign for Action*. This first forum was to act as a barometer for interest in forming NebRac. A larger forum was convened in June where the NebRac leaders were identified and roles in the Coalition were outlined. NANA was asked at this time to become a stakeholder in the organization for which the board voted unanimously in favor. After Nancy Gondringer and myself attended the forum the question the board posed to us was, how is this “Campaign for Action” important to us? The answer is this; the Campaign for Action will have an impact on nursing and healthcare, NANA can either assist in driving these changes or we can simply sit idly by and be forced to implement what other organizations deem as important. Another important factor is that the Campaign is championing the removal of scope-of-practice barriers, a goal that aligns with both our state and national organizations. Since that first forum several NANA members have posed various questions which I will attempt to answer here.

What is the Future of Nursing: Campaign for Action?

The Future of Nursing: *Campaign for Action* (the Campaign) is a collaboration created by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation (RWJF) and the AARP Foundation. The Committee of the RWJF’s Initiative on the Future of Nursing, at the Institute of Medicine (IOM) was tasked with creating a blueprint on the role of nurses in the design and improvement of healthcare and public and institutional policies at the national, state and local levels.

What are the key recommendations of the Institute of Medicine report?

1. Remove scope-of-practice barriers
2. Prepare and enable nurses to lead change to advance healthcare
3. Implement nurse residency programs
4. Increase the number of nurses with baccalaureate degrees to 80% by 2020
5. Double the number of nurses with a doctorate by 2020
6. Ensure that nurses engage in lifelong learning
7. Use of nurses in an expanded and leadership capacity to improve health outcomes and reduce cost through collaborative improvement efforts
8. Build an infrastructure for the collection and analysis of data on health care workforce requirements

How are these recommendations to be carried out?

Through the use of Regional Action Coalitions. The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and the AARP Foundation will support with technical assistance and direction Action Coalitions at the state and regional levels. No direct financial support is currently being provided; this is the responsibility of the individual Action Coalitions.

How many Action Coalitions currently exist? How many will there be?

There are currently 15 Action Coalitions which were launched in two phases: the five initial Action Coalitions (California, Michigan, Mississippi, New Jersey, and New York) started in October 2010. In February 2011, Wave II was launched with ten additional Action Coalitions: Colorado, Florida, Idaho, Indiana, Illinois, Louisiana, New Mexico, Utah, Virginia, and Washington. Wave III expansion is to begin in September of 2011, which is where the NebRAC hopes to be selected.

What do Action Coalitions do?

Action Coalitions are comprised of diverse groups of stakeholders at the state level who will work to:

1. Define individual state Coalition goals;
2. Identify key stakeholders representing a variety of sectors to build a blueprint for action;
3. Educate policymakers and other decision-makers;
4. Reach out to philanthropies/funders to seek financial support for Action Coalition efforts;

5. Gain visibility of their work and the Campaign through the media and other outlets; and
6. Work to advance the key IOM report recommendations.

Who will lead the Action Coalition?

Action Coalitions are to be led by at least two co-leads – representing nursing and non-nursing organizations. Each Action Coalition selects its own leadership and determines its overall structure. NebRAC has chosen The Visiting Nurse Association and HDR Architecture, Inc. as the co-leads in this venture.

Why are non-nurse leaders and stakeholders important?

The most crucial objective of the Action Coalitions is to encourage different sectors to become involved in the Campaign in order to build momentum and presence at all levels. This step is the most critical in accomplishing the broad changes to health care that the Campaign envisions, working together with a range of stakeholders, including physicians, nursing organizations, insurers, consumers, business, government, foundations, academia and health systems is paramount.

The Visiting Nurse Association and HDR Architecture, Inc. successfully submitted the Nebraska Action Coalition's Future of Nursing: Campaign for Action Wave III application on Wednesday, August 10, 2011. It be should be known by September 6th as to whether or not the application was accepted after which time Nebraska's Action Coalition will officially launched.

What are the expectations of the NebRAC for NANA?

(as stated by Mary Cramer, RN, PhD, NebRAC steering committee via email)

- Establish a list of interested members who will lead and/or work on the NebRAC top two priorities – Practice Advancement and Education.
- We would like your members to assist us in bringing in statewide nurse leaders from every area and non-nurse leaders from out-state Nebraska.
- We also need help in fund-raising. We are still short of our goal of \$100,000 for infrastructure support, any assistance in possible “leads” in financial contributors would be appreciated.

What is the next step?

If the NebRAC application is accepted there is talk about holding regional meetings across Nebraska beginning in September -- but much is yet to be decided on logistics.

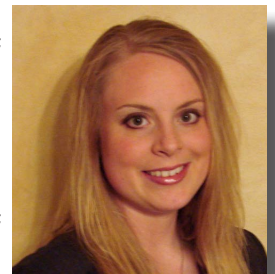

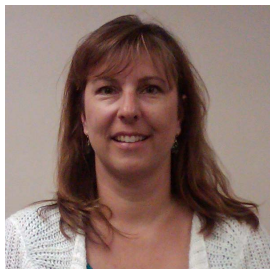
importance of continuing education and to provide high quality educational opportunities for existing practitioners to remain current on new topics and techniques in anesthesia.
